

THE NEW SCHOOL YEAR by Ann Williams

"School" has a whole new meaning these days due to mandates resulting from Covid-19. School leadership is challenged to keep students and staff safe while effectively teaching students in the classroom, online or both.

While we now know that the virus primarily affects the elderly with underlying health issues, it does not discriminate among ages. Last spring all schools were closed to protect students and staff and to prevent its spread. That began an educational odyssey for students, families and people far beyond the schools. Online learning was the only educational option then.

IHM School administration and staff immediately stepped up and created an online learning plan. Regardless of their employment situations, parents had to play a greater role in their children's education. Collaboration between the school and parents enabled students to finish the 2019-'20 curriculum and successfully meet grade standards.

This fall, IHM School parents have the option of in-person or online instruction for their children. IHM's in-person learning program follows diocesan guidelines that are based on CDC, state and local requirements to protect students and school personnel. Details of the plan, *Living Our Mission in Today's Reality*, can be found on the diocesan website.

According to Principal **Holly Lake**, all but a handful of families have chosen in-person learning, and the school is well prepared for both in-person and online instruction. Parents may change their option after the first quarter. All Catholic schools will utilize the diocese's shared learning management system, Canvas, "for organizing instructional materials and facilitating learning," as well as its shared Google domain. Mrs. Lake says that the staff has been outstanding in adapting to online teaching as well as other changes. Teachers have "studied" Canvas all summer and prepped for live classroom videoing for online learners.

These changes come at a significant cost. Sanitizing, cleaning, new technology and other expenses have increased the school's budget that was set very early in the year. The CARES Act (Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security) provides funding to support these expenses. However, Governor Gretchen Whitmer and Attorney General Dana Nessel have sued the federal government to change how nonpublic schools receive these funds, significantly reducing what is available to them.

The Killgoar Foundation's 2020-'21 allocation of \$202,000 has already provided tuition assistance to 53 families and 96 students to date. Bishop Walkowiak, a strong advocate of Catholic education, has earmarked an additional \$1,000,000 in assistance for diocesan school families impacted by Covid. An anonymous donor has funded the purchase of PPE equipment for our staff, and the Home-School Association is addressing other needs. Even so, the additional expenses will create a budget shortfall.

A successful Catholic school requires a supportive pastor, parish leadership and parish-wide support; dedicated school leadership, i.e., administration and board of education; committed staff, involved parents and volunteers. IHM School has all of that, plus the Killgoar Foundation! Despite today's challenges, our school will continue to provide the excellent spiritual and academic foundation for which it has been known for nearly 70 years.

PARISHIONER PROFILE: Rose and John MacKenzie by Terry Moore

Recently celebrating their tenth wedding anniversary, **Rose and John MacKenzie** place faith, fidelity and trust at the center of their marriage. How trusting? Well, they put a successful bid on a house in the Ridgemoor area without Rose ever having seen it herself—being on the other side of the state pursuing her nursing education. "Our realtor really wanted us to see this house," recalled Rose, "so John looked at it in the dark one night and we put a bid on it at seven the next morning. I knew I could trust him," she added with a laugh.

As with their new house, their affection for IHM was immediate and unhesitant. "We were looking for a vibrant parish with a good school. When we attended our first Mass at IHM in 2011, we knew we were home," said Rose.

Their path to the area and IHM began when John, a native of Houghton Lake, accepted a teaching position with East Grand Rapids Public Schools. After renting an apartment in Comstock Park, they looked at homes closer to where he would teach. Thus began John's nocturnal 'home inspection.'

The MacKenzies were first introduced to each other by a mutual friend when they were students at Saginaw Valley State University. "It started as a friendship and grew into a relationship," said John. They also discovered their shared values and religious roots. "I grew up as a Missouri Synod Lutheran—which I joke is 'almost Catholic'—and my family stressed a religious upbringing. We attended church every week." After a "robust" Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA), John became a Catholic on Easter of 2010.

Rose also grew up in small rural town in Michigan, Fowler. The youngest of nine children, she described "growing up on a dairy farm in a very Catholic family" where she observed her dad kneeling beside his bed to say his morning and evening prayers and watched her mom attend daily Mass. "As the youngest, I witnessed the prayer life of my parents and my older siblings especially when my brothers and sisters got married and had children of their own," said Rose.

Prayer remains a cornerstone for John and Rose and their children. Both take strength and solace from their commitment to the Adoration Chapel. For John: "It provides meaningful silence and a quality prayer time, keeping me centered even after getting out of bed at 3 a.m." Rose interjects: "At a retreat, Fr. Troy challenged a group of parish men about overnight Adoration and John felt personally called to organize 30 men to cover those times."

To Rose, the Adoration Chapel is also "the most stressful hour of my week because I bring my children." She says the trade off of keeping them quiet for an hour is for them to see how prayer is a priority in her life as it was for her as a young girl. "John and I want them to be exposed to Christ in the tabernacle."

Finding their home at IHM has meant an active parish life for the MacKenzies. Space limitations curtail a full description but it includes the Men's Ministry, Women's Bible Study, Pre-Cana program, Couples Night, Natural Family Planning instruction and the Technology Committee for IHM School.

At its core, IHM represents to the MacKenzies a "home away from home, a caring faith community."

"We really lean on living in community," said John. "At IHM we see how people lean on each other, support one another and rally whenever there's a need."
