COPING WELL WITH COVID by Ann Williams

No one knew last March that Covid was about to turn the world upside down and, with it, how children are educated. Like all other schools, IHM immediately closed its doors and began online learning per state mandate. An intense, focused effort by school staff and cooperation/collaboration with parents resulted in a successful transition that assured that IHM students continued to learn utilizing new technologies and ongoing communication between school and home.

However, unlike most other schools, IHM welcomed students back to school at the beginning of the 2020-21 school year. The vast majority of our nearly 170 families have chosen in person learning for their students. Parents, students and staff are happy, even joyful, to be back <u>in school</u>.

In the meantime, Covid related challenges remain for IHM School, among them:

- Strictly following prescribed Covid protocols, including assessing students for symptoms each morning before school
- Extended quarantine times for students/staff who may have been exposed to COVID again at different times during the original 14 days
- Teachers who must accommodate teaching in person, virtually (students "dial into" classrooms at certain times) and/or online (communicating to/from students/teachers regarding assignments/feedback electronically).
- Sanitizing surfaces every four hours and the cost of cleaning supplies
- Segregating older students by classrooms, eliminating gathering among classes
- Arranging for teachers of "special" classes, e.g., music, to move to students' homerooms with their accompanying material/equipment, rather than the students moving to the designated "special" classrooms
- The need for parents' greater involvement with students who are learning at home
- Parents unable to pay tuition due to loss of work

Principal Holly Lake has been amazed and gratified at how the school and the greater parish communities have worked together to keep everyone safe and to maintain our school's educational standards. IHM School is on track to finish the 2020-21 curriculum and meet grade standards, just as it did last year. Recently, our school was highly recommended for re-accreditation by the Michigan Association of Non-public Schools.

Recognizing that teachers are going above and beyond, parents/parishioners have provided meals and treats for staff to keep up morale. They have contributed PPEs and antiseptic wipes to protect everyone in school.

The Killgoar Foundation has provided tuition assistance for families whose financial situations were negatively impacted by Covid (99 students from 56 families).

Through it all, Holly says the school community has sensed God's protection. Students' daily immersion in faith supports and uplifts them. Morning and afternoon prayer is live streamed daily so that students at home and in school can prayer together. Their participation in weekly Masses, preparation for receiving the sacraments and time spent in the Adoration Chapel strengthen their resiliency and confidence that God is watching over them.

Holly smiles when she sees students eagerly jumping out of the car on their first day back to school. She notes that they have a new appreciation for being IN school—together with their classmates and teachers in a regular routine, learning and loving God and each other.

Perhaps Covid's lesson for all of us is that God loves us and He is in charge.

Mike and Megan Tietema Family

As parents of four IHM School students, **Mike and Megan Tietema** remain ever busy and engaged with many school and parish activities. But they're quick to say their commitment is no different from many of their friends and fellow parishioners. "The more we get involved the more we appreciate how many people contribute to IHM," said Mike. "It's truly a generous and spirit-filled community."



Raised in strong Catholic families and attending local parochial schools, Mike and Megan met at Catholic Central and went out to a movie on their first date. They remained close in high school and college. Fast forward and the Tietemas have been parishioners since their marriage at IHM in 2005. The couple have been blessed with four children, **Owen**, 13; **Ellie**, 10; **Matthew**, 9; and **Peter**, 7.

For Megan, IHM has always been her home parish. Along with her loving parents, she credits IHM School for instilling and nurturing her faith. In particular, she vividly remembers the day **Mary Passinault**, her fourth grade teacher, distributed rosaries to the class made by local nuns and constructed of string, beads and utmost devotion. "As a teacher and person, Mrs. Passinault made such a lasting impression on me, encouraging all the students to grow in faith." And yes readers, Megan still has that treasured rosary.

Attending nearby St. Paul the Apostle, Mike also valued his family and faith upbringing. "Early on, my identity with the Catholic faith and education was strong. Megan and I are very thankful for both legacies and being able to pass it along to our children."

The couple's adherence to those legacies has been evident in many volunteer activities including Adoration Chapel, Pre Cana, God's Kitchen, athletic coaching, and as past chairs of the Fall Gathering.

A Pharmaceutical Sales Representative, Mike currently serves as President of IHM's Athletic Association. Among the Association's duties is the raising of \$25,000 per year to maintain the tradition of "no pay to play." "We've tried to make our fundraisers both fun and convenient to solicit financial support," he said.

As a former Grand Rapids Public Schools elementary teacher, Megan drew from those skills and experiences nine years ago and co-founded, with fellow parishioner **Michelle David**, IHM's Catechesis of the Good Shepherd program. Aimed at preschoolers to third graders and based on the Montessori teaching method, faith lessons were offered, prior to the pandemic, after school on a weekly basis and during school once a month. "It's so rewarding to see kids respond to these lessons with light and love. It provides an opportunity to help them grow in their faith," said Megan.

Faith observances are an integral part of the Tietema household including daily prayers in the car on the way to school and at bedtime. "It's important for us to begin and end each day with prayer," said Megan.

When asked how they manage and cope with life's inevitable disappointments and hurdles, Megan replied, "We turn to our faith and the sacraments to keep us on track."

In listening to the Tietema's faith journey and practices and what IHM means to them as a couple and as a family, it seems only fitting to learn Megan's favorite podcast is called "Abiding Together."

Our local council positively impacts our parish in many ways. About 70 members comprise the IHM council which sponsors an impressive list of activities. Members flip pancakes at the semi-annual pancake breakfasts, assist with the parish picnic, clean up after the school's Second Best Sale and raise funds for Special Olympics through Tootsie Roll sales. The K of C is an integral part of what makes IHM such a vibrant parish.

All K of C efforts are aimed at building the domestic Catholic Church in one of four areas: charity, unity, fraternity, patriotism. Although many activities have been cancelled this year due to the pandemic, the Knights strive to be as helpful as possible within the necessary restrictions.

Randy MacGeorge joined the Knights eight years ago. Knowing that he has time to participate in only one charitable organization, he finds the K of C to be the right one for him. Each member decides which project or activity he feels called to support, choosing from the blood drive, the essay contest, the fifth grade bible giveaway, seminarian support, the canned food drive, free throw contests and soccer challenges. Randy now also serves as a district deputy helping other councils. He wishes he had joined earlier and invites fellow parishioners to do so.

Long-term member **Bob Wasinski** says he especially likes the service orientation of the group, which extends beyond IHM to the greater community and the church worldwide. This December alone, our Knights have organized a blood drive, a canned food drive for the St. Francis Xavier Parish food pantry, a nut sale and a "Keep Christ in Christmas" awareness program. At the diocesan level, the Knights are raising money to purchase an ultrasound machine to assist in the Right to Life focus of their mission.

Brett Huffman is one of the younger Knights. Though his school-aged children keep him busy, he encourages other men to join the Knights to make a difference. While the council as a group helps where needed, individual members can participate as they are able—the commitment is flexible. Involvement with any or many projects is welcome. Having moved here from the east side of the state, Brett sees the K of C as a great way to get involved with the parish, school and our community.

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
